During this session, participants will have the opportunity to walk in the shoes of the child of an incarcerated parent and unveil the hidden consequences that the child experiences including financial hardships, education, social interactions, mental health and more.
Win a debate and actually change someone's mind	Benjamin Kushner	We will be teaching how to debate someone and come out on top in a debate without alienating the person or coming across as mean. We will teach methods of debate that are useful in structured debate and unstructured debate and actually work to change the minds of both the listeners and even the people you're debating against.

Lauren Arianna Raskin	Students who participate in this workshop will learn about the men, woman, and children who are currently being detained in one of the 200 jails and detention centers that comprise the ICE's detention system; furthermore, they will learn about how the ICE fails to provide adequate oversight of their facilities, which has lead to overcrowding and unsanitary conditions. Those who participate will learn how to advocate for these people who come to America in search of a better life, and even write letters to members of legislation pleading for reform. They will learn about the Montgomery County Association for Immigration Advocation and how they can get more involved!
